Open House and Registration Monday September 11 at 7:30

Come out, enjoy a few dances and catch up with dance friends as the new dance season gets underway. Bring your printed form for registration or you can register by filling out the online form.

A Wee Note re Registration Fees

You will find the registration form for the 23/24 dance season included in the L&A or on the website.

Last year's combined fee of \$160 was for one season only, and reflected the Society's 100th anniversary and the Branch's 60th. It was also set lower to encourage new dancers and former members to return after the pandemic.

The total registration fee this year includes membership (local and with Scotland Headquarters for the RSCDS), and class fees for 26 weeks of twice weekly dancing, afternoon and evening classes over the dance season. Due to an increase in the Edinburgh Headquarter membership fee this year along with raised rental costs by CPUC last April, our fees this year will be increased to \$185 if paid in full (\$5 more if paid by term). Hall rentals and teacher honorariums largely contribute to the class fee, but there are some local administrative costs to cover as well.

Except for very special occasions like this past Anniversary Workshop, we have always tried to have a balanced budget and try to set registration and class fees to try to cover these costs.

I hope you will complete the registration shortly after you receive it and deliver or email it to the registrar Doug Durnin.

Look forward to seeing you at the Open House the evening of Sept 11, or in classes very soon.

Jeremiah 10:13


When God's voice is uttered, there is a tumult of waters in the heavens, God causes the clouds to ascend from the end of the earth;




Here and There...
