We are back dancing as the New Year moves along with 14 dancers as we began to review and renew. We danced Burns' Night which included an allemande which came back to our minds and feet. We danced the New Year Jig - so appropriate for the first class. This dance features several figures of eight. We also enjoyed the Silver Tassie that had us dance the rondelle. At the end of the class 4 couples danced the Burns' Hornpipe as the man and lady took turns weaving in and out of the lines and ended up doing a poussette. It's a favourite to watch as those dancing in the men's line stand with arms folded and right foot counting the beat!

We are all looking forward to the Burns night social on Saturday, January 21. Hope to see you there.

I was so pleased to be in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick last fall for a visit. Gift shops, of course, are a must. At one shop I bought a book called <u>Gaelic in Your Gob</u> - four dozen English words that came from the Scottish Highlands by Michael Newton. (The publisher gives permission to use short excerpts or quotations.) Over the next few editions, I would like to share some of these words.

It might be most appropriate to start with **GOB**. Gob is a well-established slang term referring to the mouth, usually with mocking, sarcastic, or humorous overtones such as "gob-smacked"(astonished), gobstopper (hard candy), and "gobshite (loud mouth or indiscreet person). Gob is also familiar to the Irish and in northern England, but most common with the Lowland Scots who borrowed the word from the Scottish Gaelic *gob*, which refers primarily to the beak of a bird. It is also used for the human mouth. A common Gaelic admonition used by adults to silence a child is *Duin do ghob! "Shut your beak!"*

From the Library ...

There will be a small selection of library materials at the social for browsing. There will be a box of recent donations which are duplicates of what we have in the library archives for dancers to take.

Plaids and Tartans. Congratulations to our December kilt contest winners. David Kroeker with his assistant Debbie identified the tartan as a Cockburn. I have included a photo of this month's kilt for our name the tartan contest. It has a 36 inch waist and is 27 inches long. \$15.00

Sashes. With our monthly socials and upcoming workshop ball you might want to dress up by wearing a sash. If you have a piece of family tartan you want to fashion it into a sash to wear on special occasions. If you look online there are several styles requiring different lengths of fabric. The first sash I was shown by Jean Miller was a length of fabric 88 inches long and 12 inches wide. It was folded in half, edged, and gathered at one end with an elastic to make a half circle. Pin the sides to

the band to hold it into a half rosette and fringe the ends. Add your Scottish brooch and you are ready to pin it to your blouse.

One year at Folklorama a kilt maker was demonstrating how to make a full rosette. For this you need fabric 12 inches wide and about 100 inches of fabric. You fold the fabric lengthwise in half and then fold the top down 6 to 7 Inches depending how large you want your rosette and then gather across the middle of the folded fabric to make the rosette. This folding requires a bit of planning as you want your tartan lines to match on the outer edges to make the lines go in a circle. I usually pleat the layers of fabric before gathering it and hand stitching it. Then you join the outer edges to make of the rosette. You can trim the sash length to what you need and fringe the ends. I like the upper strip to be a bit longer as it needs a bit more length to cross to the side waist for pinning.

The length of your sash will vary depending on your skirt length. A floor length skirt looks better with a longer sash. Attaching the sash requires a few pins. It is pinned on your blouse under the rosette (in the hollow of the chest I was told), and a pin at the base of the neck secures the two lengths and you are almost done. The lower band is allowed to fall down your back and the upper length is pinned at the side waist. Some people use a small brooch here instead of a pin.

Et Voila! You are all set to dance out on the town!
