Workshop 2024

What a wonderful weekend!

It was such a pleasure to have David Booz from Toronto come and share his love of dance with our keen dancers on April 20. David started off the morning with an unpublished three couple jig written by Barbara McNutt (David's mother) entitled Grandfather's Old Sock. David himself described it as "hand exercises masquerading as a



dance." The techniques we focused on for this dance included long and short skip-change of step and giving firm hands and strong arms - notably in the grand chain formation. While we were praised for how we executed each of these techniques separately, incorporating our good form into the dance was where the challenges began! We met these challenges head-on, recognizing the importance of thinking ahead and communication within the set when there's not much time to think between fast-moving formations.

A three couple strathspey Lady Lucy Ramsay, from Miss Milligan's Miscellany, followed. Once again, we had the chance to work on our strong hands in the grand chain - no droopy arms! With a bit more time to think, we were encouraged to engage our peripheral vision to help with our covering. Strong hands and arms were also at play in half rights and lefts, especially on the sidelines where we helped each other to remember those unexpected polite turns. David offered a lovely take on leading down the middle as the dancing couple's solo and time to shine!

One of the benefits of workshops is that we're here to be stretched out of our comfort zones, and we had the opportunity to learn an unusual dance with unusual and tricky figures and transitions to challenge our feet and brains. Kiss Me Quick My Mither's Coming is a three couple reel from Book 12, written in 1748. There was no sleeping during this dance, with third couples beginning the dance with 24 bars of reels, crossover reels of three, and first couple doing full figures of eight casting up from second place. It required stamina and teamwork, but also a sense of humour. We're here for the love of dance and the joy of being able to dance as a community, and messing up is part of learning and growing as a dancer. As David said, you get one point for doing the dance right, and two points for messing up, trying again, and fixing it!

It was wonderful to see many of the participants ask David some great questions about the dances and techniques, and equally wonderful to have such a supportive, good-humoured, and encouraging guest teacher. I'm very grateful to have had the experience to dance and learn with this terrific community.

Following the morning of dancing we had an opportunity to sit, rest our feet, and relax over a wonderful lunch spread of sub sandwiches (Hoagie Boyz), vegetable and fruit trays (Sobeys), and sweets to finish off. Thanks to Ellen and her crew for all their hard work. Our feet were certainly tired from the morning dancing so having the afternoon off (nap anyone?) was greatly appreciated.

The evening social programme was guided by Cheryl Durnin as Peter McClure was unable to attend.


