Thursday class

Thursday attendees have enjoyed a variety of dances. Have you danced the "Thing-a-ma-Jig" before? If you were in attendance at one of our Thursday afternoon classes, you would have been thrown into this little gem, devised by Cheryl to trick us into practising phrasing. As we cycled through the formations, to the tune of a bicycle built for two, we paid attention to the timing of double figures of eight and rights and lefts. "Birks of Invermay" is a dance named after a grove of trees along a river in Scotland. A bit of googling, yielded the fact that "birk" is a scots word meaning "birch" as in birch tree. Here I was thinking that the "Birks of Invermay" was devised for a rich family who sold jewelry, but it was all about trees. The instructions for "Birks of Invermay" first appeared in 1789. So, perhaps Cheryl's "Thing-a-ma-Jig" might be still going strong a couple of hundred years from now.

With Cheryl and Doug away in Mexico, our teacher candidates, Sharyl and James, and Peter stepped in to hold the fort. Sharyl put us to work perfecting pas-de-bas to prepare us for double triangles for the dance The Beeswing and the following week, Lady Dumfries. James led us through cross over reels for Maxwell's Rant and Peter closed the class with Granville Market, a fun and easy dance. Our teacher candidates also reviewed some of the dances on the March Social.

There are a lot of people who work behind the scenes to ensure RSCDS Winnipeg runs along smoothly, and there is actually a dance named "Behind the Scenes" which was devised for Kathleen Johnston, who worked behind the scenes for the Dufftown Scottish Country Dance Club. This dance had an interesting turn partner, turn corner figure. 
As dancers we know music and dance are inseparable. Can you imagine there being dance without music?


