### Class Notes

## Fort Garry Social Class (Monday)

During the month of March the Fort Garry Class reviewed complex figures. One - The Bourrell for 3 Couples – was reviewed by dancing Barbara's Strathspey – a favorite dance of mine and not because of the name. As the name suggests, the 3 couple Bourrell is a derivative from of the Bourrell for 2 Couples. It appears to me that the Ft. Garry Class is beginning to skillfully dance this complex figure.

Another complicated figure – La Baratte - was reviewed while dancing the Haggis Tree by John Drewry. I for one am grateful there is no such thing as a Haggis Tree, but am grateful for John Drewry's imagination and creativity. He is considered one of the greatest devisers of Scottish country dances. La Baratte is his complex 6-bar way of crossing for a couple or for any man and the lady facing him to exchange positions in either strathspey step or skip change of step.

We practiced and practiced the Allemande for 3 Couples, trying our best to perform it as gracefully as possible. When we moved to the Circulating Allemande, our paths degenerated. We will keep trying to make the Circulating Allemande an elegant means of progression and won't give up in achieving the goal of elegance, which we almost did achieve when we danced the Flower of Glasgow by Ruth Taylor . Just as we did not give up on learning The Ruby Rant by Francis Walduck, who is the Vice Chair of the RSCDS and has been chair of the Queensland, Australia Branch of the RSCDS. The Ruby Rant is a unique combination of figures and flow, requiring footwork we don't usually encounter. Ruby Rant is challenging and fun for the dancers and I imagine delightful to watch.

We practiced reels when dancing Roy Goldring's The Dancing Man, who is Bob Campbell. Our own Mr. Morrison was home with a cold when we worked on the mentally challenging Mr. Morison by Hugh Foss and got the chance to practice more reels. We had fun dancing the jig – Rory O'More – a pre-celebration of St. Patrick's Day and the Shamrock Girl by Roy Goldring – a post-celebration of St. Patrick's Day.

This month of dancing was filled with cooperation and harmony, good humor and fun on the part of the teacher and the students.

We were treated to enjoyable evenings for the remaining weeks of the term. One evening we learned the dance All the Eights which was devised by Brenda Burnell of the Leeds Branch written in honour of Ivy Dawson who began SCD at the amazing age of 75. Apparently she had previously done ballroom dancing and also ceilidh dancing. The dance was devised for her 88th birthday and Brenda also devised another very interesting dance in a 9 person set called Nifty Ninety to celebrate her 90th birthday. Many of us will remember Brenda who was a guest teacher at one of our workshops. Other dances included on the program were Aging Gracefully (which I think we all do by participating in this activity of SCD), The Sailor, Granville Market and a variation on Round and Roundabout.

The following week's program included many dances on the Spring Social Program and, in fact, you will find many of these dances on the ball program. Many of us, especially our newer dancers, will find it reassuring and helpful to see these dances repeated on subsequent programs. There was a good turnout

at our last social and it was fun to again meet and dance with our newer dancers. We thank the Wednesday class and the COM for their hospitality in hosting this event.

It is hard to believe that another year of classes has come to an end. Where does the time go when you are having fun? Our final class featured favourite dances done during the year and we enjoyed delicious refreshments and socializing to end our evening. Thank you to Wendy and Pat and everyone else who helped out that evening. Thank you Peter for a great year and thank you to all the dancers who came out. It was really wonderful to have an average of 4 sets on the floor most evenings. I dream about a time when we have similar numbers at everyone of our weekly classes. But our dancing is not finished! We hope to see many of you out at the workshop and/or the General classes on Wednesdays for three weeks in May.

#### **Technique (Tuesday)**

During March and April classes Maureen introduced us to a couple of neat warm-up dances, of which one was the *Montrose Reel*. The figures of this dance mimic responding to a shipwreck: raising the call, passing the information, responding to the call, and helping to rescue passengers. The composer of this dance chose the formations well. The other fun and easy warm-up dance we have been doing is *McDonald's Saunter*. You needed to be alert after the warm up because Maureen has been teaching us some new and unusual formations! Introducing something different to most, if not all, dancers, Maureen has devoted some time to teaching us the very cool "celtic reel" for the dance *First Rain of Spring* by a composer from South Africa, which I think everyone enjoyed. Another less common figure we have been working on is "La Baratte", a curious and graceful way for man and lady to change places to opposite sides of the dance. On the subsequent evening, we learned the dance *The Left Handed Salute*, which has two "La Barattes". Still another figure Maureen had us working on was the "3 couple Bourrel" for the dance *Miss Eleanor*. The "chain progression" or the "chaperoned progression" is quite a unique formation occurring in the dance *The Countess of Dunmore's Reel*.

Maureen has continued to drill us on more familiar formations –insisting on correct timing for "turn corner, partner, corner, partner". She emphasized the speed of this formation in quick time and we followed up by dancing Berwick Johnny.

April 12<sup>th</sup> was the last Tuesday evening class – so no step practice this evening but instead a chance to revisit a couple of the more interesting formations Maureen has introduced to us this winter session, namely the "chain progression" and the "celtic reel". Ron was delighted to dance the very graceful strathspey, MacDonald of the Isles, which apparently is his favorite dance. The last dance of the season was Mairi's Wedding. Maureen was acknowledged for her hard work this term; then we pulled chairs up to the snack table where we ended the evening noshing on goodies and chatting.

#### **Basics of SCD (Wednesday)**

Many of our classes in March and April were spent learning the dances for the spring social. As Tartan Day recognizes the **Declaration of Arbroath**, a declaration Scottish independence, Cheryl tried to find dances of a patriotic theme. One such dance is *Keep the Country Bonny Lass* created around 1752. The dance has reels of three both across the dance and on the sidelines in a continuous formation. We worked long and hard on getting the sequence correct! A lighter and easier dance was The *Woodland Wanderers*, danced to the tune of Teddy Bears' Picnic. Cheryl thought that the tune heralded spring and the word picnic was a fitting reminder of our own picnic to come at the end of the social. Cheryl reminded dancers the sequence of steps for the all round pousette and the circulating allemande in preparation for the *Flower of Glasgow*, a dance written for Kay Munn, one of the teachers who will be a the workshop in April. We enjoyed Peter's tutelage for one evening in March and honed the timing for turn corner turn partner in quick time, then danced a somewhat similar formation in Davey Nick Nack.

A full moon was shining on the evening of March 23<sup>rd</sup> and Cheryl, in a fit of lunacy, embarked on the tangled task of teaching tandem reels. Cheryl used a book of dances from New Zealand with enticing titles of a marine theme. Who wouldn't want to dance to "The Playful Porpoise"? Cheryl decided that we definitely would. Tandem reels were meant to convey the image of playful porpoises cresting above the waves, but I am not sure we attained that degree of grace – sinking beneath the waves might be closer to our level of prowess. We revisited tandem reels again during our very last class, andthen closed out the season with some familiar dances, Flower of Glasgow, Flowers of Edinburgh and Catch as Catch Can. Although we were a small group, the nibbles brought in by dancers provided a tasty backdrop for sitting and chatting and recognizing Cheryl for a year of excellent classes despite our dwindling numbers in the colder months.

Wednesday April 6<sup>th</sup> was the Tartan Day spring social hosted by the Wednesday evening class with a lot of help from a lot of other people. Cheryl had devised a program that most Wednesday dancers could participate in and enjoy. Thanks to everyone who brought food and helped out in the kitchen.
