From the Chair....

In June, we were suddenly into "summer" weather which has continued on into July. Since taking over as Chair, the new Committee of Management has been kept busy catching up on all the details of the various committees and projects. First of all, a special thank you to the outgoing COM members - to Pat Clubb, our immediate past Chair who has done a great job of all that needed to be done throughout the year, with her calm manner and warm smile. One never wanted to say "no" to her. To Glen Colquhoun, our Webmaster, who has done such an excellent job of maintaining our website since the beginning, plus recently redesigning it to give it a fresh look! Thank you to both of you. To our new COM members - Joyce Cormack, who stepped up to the plate to be Vice-Chair; to Sheila Careless, our new Webmaster; and Maureen Burnham, the new Teachers' Rep - a warm welcome. To our returning COM members, thank you for your ongoing commitment to the Branch.

Although regular classes are now over (except for Demonstration rehearsals), the work behind the scenes and in public carries on. We have recently just attended "Heritage Days" at Lower Fort Garry. Over these seven days, 1,537 Grade 5 children from various school divisions, in groups of approximately 8 to 24, came through the doors of the "Married Settlers' Quarters", where Joyce Cormack taught them a simple Scottish

Country Dance that might have been danced in the early days of the Settlers. Joyce did a great job of teaching all these children, helped by members of the Branch who came out regularly to support her. Our thanks to all of you.

As you know, we are in the throes of preparing for the Winnipeg Branch's 50th Anniversary next year. The special project we are working on is the recording of a CD of dance music by Scotch Measure, for dances submitted by Branch members, plus the accompanying book of the chosen dances. We had two evenings of reviewing the dances at St. Paul's Church Hall, and members who participated voted on each dance. The final review of the dances chosen was held on July 19th.

Our Jubilee Social was held on Friday, June 15th, to honour HM the Queen's Diamond Jubilee. HM the Queen is Patron of the RSCDS. The hall was appropriately decorated in red, white and blue, including two large Union Jack shields (from Mug Pub days) and a table display of "Royal Memorabilia". Everyone who came was "dressed up" in some fashion for the occasion – sparkling tiaras, long dresses with long white gloves, pearl necklaces, and the men in Highland dress! The music for the special program of dances, played so well by Ken Natrass on accordion and Ron Krug on piano, added greatly to the occasion. Towards the end of the evening, when we sang *God Save the Queen*, followed by *Auld Lang Syne*, there were a few "lumps" in the throat and a "tear in the eye".

We enjoyed fare fit for a "Queen"! There were tea and coffee poured from silver tea/coffee pots into lovely china tea cups, cucumber sandwiches, egg sandwiches, pancakes and jam, fruit platter, dainties to name but a few and a lovely cake to top off the evening. Nobody wanted to go home! A very big "thank you" goes to Anne Morrison, our Social Convener, and all her many helpers, for arranging this delicious fare with that touch of elegance, plus all the decorating of the hall. It all added up to make the Jubilee Social a special event.

Earlier that same evening, we bade "au revoir" to Maggie Careless, one of our new Branch members this past year (she is the daughter of Sheila and Bruce Careless). Maggie was leaving for the UK in a few days time, for approximately two years, to work and travel, and we hope dance, around the country. She has been a great supporter of the Branch events throughout the year. We will miss her, but we wish her well and good luck in her travels.

On June 23rd, some of us were at The Forks celebrating Multicultural Days, where we had a booth and also did a short demonstration. I hope that you all had a happy time on July 1st, celebrating Canada Day. Wasn't it hot? The Demonstration Team, wearing their Selkirk Settlers' costumes, danced at Lower Fort Garry. They were joined by the Windsor Children Scottish Country Dancers. The children have been joining us out there for the past few years. It is always a delight to have them, and they are so warmly received by the audience. Later that afternoon, the Demonstration Team travelled to Teulon to join the local Métis group in their Canada Day celebrations. In spite of the heat, we managed to find a lovely shady spot under a large tree with overhanging branches and, as a plus, there was a gentle breeze blowing! It was so pleasant to sit there and relax as we waited for our turn to go on stage. All in all, a lovely day.

The main celebrations of the Bicentennial of the Selkirk Settlers will take place during the first two weeks of September, including the Branch's contribution of a Pageant/Ceilidh on Friday, September 7th at Lower Fort Garry. Further information regarding this event is printed in this issue of the *Light and Airy*.

Also included in these celebrations is a Formal Dinner on Saturday, September 8th at the Winnipeg Convention Centre, coordinated by the St. Andrews Society, on behalf of the Bicentenary of the Red River Selkirk Settlement Committee. The following is a little information on an upcoming event that the Winnipeg Branch is presenting as a part of the celebrations of the 200th anniversary of the arrival of the Red River Selkirk Settlers in what is now Manitoba.

The bicentennial celebrations will be held from September 1-9, 2012 at various venues. The RSCDS event will be a pageant/ceilidh to be held at Lower Fort Garry on September 7, 2012 at 7:00 pm. The pageant will depict the arrival of the Selkirk Settlers at York Factory in August 1812 and their subsequent journey to The Forks. This will be followed by a ceilidh, with participation dancing and a sing-a-long. To end the evening, refreshments of light Scottish fare will be served.

Admission is free but you must have a ticket to get in. Due to the limited space and the tremendous interest in the pageant/ceilidh, **there are no more tickets available for this event.** However, a waiting list is being kept in case there are cancellations. Big Bike 2012

June 20, 2012

Introducing Scottish Country Dancing

What is it that has made this dancing so attractive to so many people who have no connection with Scotland? It is perhaps, first of all, the social intercourse not found in so many other forms of Ballroom Dancing. In Scottish Country Dancing, the form of the dance, in sets of four or more couples, allows dancers to meet and dance with all the people in the set, and so friends are made, for it is quite correct to ask anyone in the set to dance without further introduction.

Next is the music ... No country in the world has a richer store of dance music than has Scotland.

Thirdly, the technique, which offers a real challenge and keeps people interested and alert. The better the technique, the more pleasant and easy becomes the dancing, and this fact keeps the dancers on their toes mentally and physically.
