## Here and There

### St. Andrew's Day

St. Andrew is the patron saint of Scotland, as well as several other countries, including Greece, Romania, Russia and Ukraine. He is also the patron saint of fishermen, fishmongers, rope-makers, golfers and performers.

St. Andrew's Day is celebrated each year on November 30, the date on which St. Andrew was crucified in Patras, Greece in 60 AD. The Scottish flag, the Saltire, is based on the X-shaped cross on which St. Andrew was crucified.

According to legend, a monk called Regulus brought relics of St. Andrew to Scotland, where he was given land to build a church by a Pictish king. The settlement grew into the town of St. Andrew's, where the cathedral became a place of religious pilgrimage and the university, the oldest in Scotland, was founded in 1413.

St. Andrew's Day is Scotland's national day. In Scotland, and many countries with Scottish connections, the day is marked by a celebration of Scottish culture, with traditional Scottish food, music and dance.

Schools across Scotland hold special St. Andrew's Day events and activities, including art shows, Scottish Country Dancing, lunchtime ceilidhs, dance festivals, storytelling, reciting and writing poems, writing tall tales, cooking traditional Scottish meals, and bagpipe playing!

In Scotland today, the day is also seen as the start of a season of Scottish winter festivals encompassing St. Andrew's Day, Hogmanay and Burns Night.
