Big Bike 2013

June 18, 2013

The Winnipeg Scottish Country Dancers raised \$1,819 for the Manitoba Heart and Stroke Foundation in this year's Big Bike event. Our top fundraiser was Barbara LeBow, with \$250 in pledges, followed closely by Team Captain Heather Ferguson (\$210) and Sheila Careless (\$200).

Our team of 16 riders was joined by a small team from Victoria General Hospital, where Christine Wallace has been undergoing treatment. As you can see from the picture, we dedicated our ride to Christine.

It was a lovely sunny evening on June 18 as the Big Bike left The Forks at 7:30 pm. Decked out in tartan, the team of RSCDS dancers, family and friends travelled down Waterfront Drive to the Selkirk Settlers monument and back, with selections from the *Prairie Gold* CD playing from the loudspeaker.

In the June 2013 Big Bike event, 53 Manitoba teams raised over \$117,000 in Winnipeg, over \$5,000 in Morden/Winkler and almost \$30,000 in Brandon. The goal of the Heart and Stroke Foundation is to reduce Canadians' rate of death from heart disease and stroke by 25 per cent by 2020.

Thank you to everyone who supported our Big Bike team this year.

Transatlantic Ceilidh

August 10, 2013

On the afternoon of Saturday, August 10, 2013, over 20 members of the Winnipeg Scottish community participated in a Transatlantic Ceilidh with the people of Helmsdale, in the Kildonan area of Scotland. The event was part of the Translocation Festival, which was held from August 3-17 to commemorate the Bicentenary of the Kildonan Clearances. The Festival was organized by the Timespan Museum and Arts Centre and the Helmsdale community.

Winnipeg was asked to participate in the Ceilidh as many of the people who were displaced by the Kildonan Clearances made their way to the Red River area with the assistance of Lord Selkirk. Many places in Winnipeg are named after these settlers – Helmsdale Avenue, East Kildonan, West Kildonan, Old Kildonan, North Kildonan and Kildonan Drive. Prominent names among the 1813 settlers included Sutherland, Bannerman and Matheson, all names of streets in Winnipeg's North End.

The Winnipeg portion of the Ceilidh was held in the Cultural Room of the Pavilion of Scotland (Glenwood Community Centre) while the Helmsdale event was held at the Timespan Museum. The two locations were able to join together in this celebration through the technology of Skype. The Ceilidh began at 3:00 pm (9:00 pm in Helmsdale) with speeches from both locations, including greetings from the descendants of the Kildonan settlers from Winnipeg who travelled to Helmsdale for the event. Phyllis Fraser, Chair of the Bicentenary of the Red River Selkirk Settlement Committee, spoke on behalf of the Winnipeg site.

After the speeches, the Winnipeg participants danced *Riverside* for those in Helmsdale, followed by participants from both sites dancing *Strip the Willow* together, to music from the Helmsdale site. Both locations enjoyed refreshments after signing off. The Winnipeg participants enjoyed Empire Cookies, Shortbread and Fly Cemetery (raisin squares) with tea and coffee.

Thank you to the RSCDS members who came out to support this historic event on such short notice, Joyce Cormack for leading the dances on the Winnipeg side, Phyllis Fraser for her remarks, the Bicentenary Committee for covering the cost of the refreshments, and the Pavilion of Scotland for providing the venue. A special thank you must go to Keith Rempel, President of the Manitoba Highland Dancers Association, whose equipment and expertise made this event possible.
